Early Voting for both the primary and general elections begins 15 days before and continues up to Election Day.		
Alaska has cancelled its Republican primary election, and all delegates are expected to be allocated to the incumbent President Trump. Only Democratic voters can vote in the Democratic primary. However, voting centers will process same day voter registration and changes in party affiliation. Voting Centers can be found here . The Democratic primary will operate a ranked-choice primary in 2020.

Voting Eligibility

To vote in Alaska, an individual must be a U.S. citizen, must reside in Alaska, and must be at least 18 years old or within 90 days of their 18th birthday. If you meet those requirements, you must also not be registered in another state, unless you are willing to cancel that registration, and you must not have been convicted of a felony involving moral turpitude, unless your voting rights have been restored.

Voter Registration

In 2016, Alaska voters approved a ballot measure to implement Automatic Voter Registration and automatic voter information updates through applications to the Permanent Fund Dividend (PFD). The Division of Elections will use this information to register new voters or update information for voters who are already registered. All applicants will receive notice of their registration and will then have 30 days to opt-out. Individuals can still register to vote online, in person, or by mail. Voter Identification

Voters in Alaska will be asked for identification if voting at a polling place. Acceptable forms of ID include:

- Voter ID card
- Driver's license or State ID
- Military ID
- Passport
- Hunting or fishing license
- Any current or valid photo ID
- Additionally, if you do not have one of the above forms of ID, you may present a current utility bill or paycheck, government check, bank statement, or other government issued document.
